New Rank Requirements

Effective January 1, 2017, regardless of your rank, all scouts are now required to use the updated 13th version of the BSA Scout Book and rank requirements. If you have been getting requirements signed off in an older book, you must do the additional and updated requirements in the new book.

There is no need to purchase an updated book; there is a pdf of the current updated rank requirements on our website. Just print it out and add the pages to your book. Be sure to get rank requirement signatures on the new pages.


Doing the Right Thing May Not Be Easy

My Eagle Scout Project By: Raymond Menting

I first got the idea for my Eagle Scout project from a *Boys Life* magazine where there was an article about how our bat population is dying off from a disease called White Nose Syndrome. This is where a fungus or mold starts to grow on the bat and slowly suffocates it. I decided to put up three bat houses to try and help the bats repopulate in our area of Wisconsin. I decided on putting them at my church because my church is right next to a river where there are many insects giving the bats a lot to eat. Any time I had a question about something I would turn to Mr. Marek who was my Project Coach. I highly recommend having a Project Coach to any Scout who is starting their Eagle Project. Once I decided where I was going to put the bat houses, I started looking at different bat house designs. In the end, I chose two different designs and combined them for my final design. Once everything was in place, I got several Scouts together to help shop for the supplies. When you are shopping for supplies make sure to keep the receipts to total up the cost at the end of the project. After I went shopping with a group of Scouts, the wood needed to be cut.

First, I had to draw out the outlines for the size of the boards needed, two Scouts and I drew the outlines. Then we had to cut out the wood. After the wood was cut, I assembled a group of Scouts to help. After I went shopping with a group of Scouts, the wood needed to be cut. First, I had to draw out the outlines for the size of the boards needed, two Scouts and I drew the outlines. Then we had to cut out the wood. After the wood was cut, I assembled a group of Scouts to help put together the bat houses. After 3-4 hours with the help of 5 adults and 6 Scouts, the bat houses were assembled. The next step after assembly, was painting the bat houses with a group of 3 Scouts and 1 adult. We were finished priming and painting in 2-3 hours. The bat houses which measure 4.5ft x 2ft x 5.75in were then installed on two sections of 10ft Galvanized Steel Pipe. For the installation of the pipe I had the help of 5 adults and 6 Scouts. We put the poles into concrete. Once the concrete hardened we came back and put the bat houses on the poles. Unfortunately, we experienced metal failure with one of the Galvanized Steel Pipes, which resulted in one of the bat houses breaking off at the threads and crashing to the ground. This was very hard to see after all our hard work. This taught me that no matter how much you plan, something can always go wrong. I still learned a lot about planning, record keeping, organization, and development of my leadership skills.
